Pastor Aaron's Message

Dear People of God,

Lately, I have been thinking quite a bit about how we find rest and renewal in times of weariness and exhaustion like this past year. We all have a rhythm that helps us to deal with this, whether it is vacation, working on a hobby, or just taking it easy. In times like what we've been dealing with, this becomes even more important and valuable, and helps us to find new life ahead.



In December, the Church Council voted to create a sabbatical policy for TLC's rostered leaders. Sabbatical, which is rooted in the idea of Sabbath, is an opportunity for deacons and pastors to take a step back from their normal routine and engage in deeper study, receive spiritual nourishment, and be re-energized when they return to the congregation. It is an opportunity to not only help the leader to re-energize, but also for the congregation to learn and grow as a result of their rostered leader's study and development. Other professions, like doctors and university professors, also take sabbaticals to learn and grow more in their field of study, and companies have started these programs to help renew and strengthen their workforce. I find it interesting that this idea is based in Sabbath, the blessing that God gives in Scripture for our renewal and rest. God knows that we need that for ourselves.

Now, you might be wondering about a few things. Is it vacation? No, it isn't. While part of the time is meant for rest and time away, there are still expectations for learning and growth, and the rostered leader comes back to the congregation to share what they have learned along the way.

How long is the sabbatical? Our policy allows for 3 months. This is time away, so all pastoral or deaconal responsibilities will need to be supported by other staff and members of the congregation.

Who covers the expenses of the sabbatical? TLC will continue to pay full salary and benefits (base salary, housing allowance, pension, and insurance coverage). Car and travel allowance, since it is a ministry expense, will not be paid. There are opportunities to fundraise or to seek grants.

We have been blessed to have Deacon Chris St.Clair serving this congregation for over 10 years, and so we have begun the process of preparing for his sabbatical. He will be going on this sabbatical from May 1 to July 31, 2021, taking the time to focus on his call as a deacon and deepening his relationship with God. I will let Deacon Chris lay out more of the plan for his sabbatical in a future article, but I'm grateful for his good work and am excited to see how this time will shape and revitalize him and his ministry.

In these wearisome times, hear this declaration from Jesus in Matthew 11: "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest."

From the Treasurer

This is only my second Trumpet article in my nearly four years off and on as Treasurer, but I believe it is a message that needs sharing. First, thank you to our very supportive congregants who gave generously throughout 2020 despite the pandemic and the lack of in-person worship. Second, thanks to our wonderful Pastor, Deacon, Ryan Anderson, Gordon Hengst, and the whole Worship & Music Ministry Team who have made both our online and streaming worship opportunities possible. Both have truly been a blessing.


Some of you may be wondering about our financial status as a result of the pandemic. Here is the abbreviated edition of the truth as I know it. We ended 2020 very nicely for two reasons. First was your generosity in meeting our budgeted giving most of the year. Second, our Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) Loan for \$87,600 was approved and later converted to a grant, making up for lack of revenue from the Mother's Day Out and Preschool Early Childhood Programs (ECP) that had to shut down last spring.

For 2021, I am sad to report that under the current rules, we do NOT qualify for a second loan/grant under the PPP Round 2 rules. We did not miss it by much, but a miss is a miss. That is \$87,600 we won't be receiving this year. While ECP is rebuilding their programs, the enrollment numbers are still nowhere near what they were in 2019

and early 2020, so we cannot yet count on ECP as a significant source of revenue.

For January 2021, we did not meet our budgeted goal for General Operations giving nor Building Fund giving. To be more specific, we missed our General Operations budget of \$33,000 by \$5,600, and our Building Fund budget of \$7,592 by \$1,000. That, combined with our loss of a net \$8,000 profit from ECP, puts us over \$14,000 behind for the month of January. I have said it before, but to be sure everyone knows, we have a “must pay” loan for our Fellowship Hall mortgage of \$7,592 per month. And that starts over every month. Any shortages must be taken from reserves, and under our current circumstances, it is difficult to make up those deficits.

Last year, we suggested that if every household could increase giving by just 10%, we could make up for the bulk of our losses. As an example, if you are giving \$20 per week, go to \$22 per week. If you are giving \$100 per month, go to \$110 per month. A little bit more from each of us will go a long way toward balancing our budget during these unusual pandemic times. But it is really a lot more than just balancing our budget. What we really want and need to do is continue all of our ministries, which include our payroll, building, and maintenance costs.

As a congregation, we have always come together when something is needed, and this year, the need is to continue operating our ministries at the same level as past years and ensure our mortgage payments are met.

I was always that guy that hated it when the church started talking about money, but now as Treasurer, having to sign the checks and approve the payroll, I look at the needs of our church in a whole different light. I am happy to show anybody who is interested exactly where we stand financially and how we reduced our budget for 2021 in anticipation of reduced ECP income. It is not complex, but if you are not into spreadsheets, you might need some explanation of what’s what. The Discipleship Program is thriving. Although many of the functions were modified due to the COVID-19 pandemic, our work continues. At the beginning of 2021, many programs and activities were placed under the microscope (so to speak). Hope abounds and the desire to return to normalcy is strong; however, the pandemic is still a threat in 2021 and we will continue to function with caution. An overall approach (long range planning) is being taken to expand and continue our mission:

"The Discipleship Team is committed to Helping People Grow In Christ outside of the worship environment."

In January, the Discipleship Team focused on:

- **Faith Formation for Adults:** online learning, "Work of the People," and "Bible Project 123"
- **WNL:** resumed activities on Feb 3, 2021
- **Children's Chapel:** received great reviews from the Synod Bishop's office (Great work, Deacon Chris!) and we are evaluating how to incorporate high school students and more people in general.
- **Youth Ministry Program:** service projects and a bowling outing are planned for this spring, Summer Camp in June/July for all ages, Mission Trip for Senior High in July, and Vacation Bible School for K - 6th graders in July.
- **Family Retreat:** April 30 – May 2 at Slumber Falls
- **Collaborative Effort with Other Ministry Teams:** Discipleship, Servant Outreach, and Stewardship are developing a cooperative strategy to enhance our Faith Formation activities.

The Good Steward

“Fear is a reaction. **Courage** is a decision.” — Attributed to Winston Churchill

What do you fear? I don't mean the biblical understanding of fear, which more closely means awe or reverence, but the kind that stops you in your tracks and makes you rethink things. Over the past year with the pandemic, the February winter storm that took us all by surprise, the shortage of water, and no power for days on end, we have had lots of opportunities to rethink some things. My personal journey has made me consider the things I prioritize — and I have done some shuffling of those priorities. But what about the courage part? What have you done that has been courageous? What actions have you taken that pushed aside the fears brought on by all that stuff you could not control?

There is no fear in love. But perfect love drives out fear, because fear has to do with punishment. The one who fears is not made perfect in love. — 1 John 4:18 NIV

How many times have you heard or even said “God loves you?” Maybe the better question is, “How many times during the day do you think or say it?” In these challenging times, our communities have shouted, “God loves you,” in so many ways. Family, friends, and neighbors have stepped out in courage to love those

around them. They do it every time there is a wave from across the street, a smile when they drive by, a phone call just to check up on you. During the time power was out in my neighborhood, my neighbors shared their grill — they became my meals on wheels! Hot soup was delivered, dinners were sent across the street, phone calls were made, and “checking in” became a daily thing, several times a day! Not only did they say “God loves you,” they demonstrated that deep, courageous, and abiding love of our Father. This most recent experience stands out, but if we are honest and think back, God's love has been delivered to us because someone decided to be the hands and feet of a loving and generous God. That is courage!!

*But now this is what the LORD says, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: **Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have summoned you by name; you are mine.** — Isaiah 43:1 NIV (emphasis mine)*

The Good Steward is a person of courage, not fear. We live in a world driven by reactions to our surroundings, but that does not mean they have to define us. That means we have opportunities every day to choose for courage. We have the great gift and honor to spread God's love to those we meet every day. Some will recognize it and accept, some will turn it away, but we have stepped out in love to those we encounter.

Love conquers all — and I think that is the best way to live in a reactionary world. Join me as I do my best to be a conqueror for Christ!




January 2021 Financials

KEY POINTS:

- ✦ **Bottom Line: Net Income** for **January** was -\$13,976, a very slow start to 2021. See the Financial Summary at the bottom of the page for more detail.
- ✦ **General Offering:** Weekly Offering through **January** was \$27,465, net -\$5,604 against programmed. ECP's Preschool program income is helping, but this will likely be a slow rebuild, most of the year.
- ✦ **Building Fund: Bldg Fund Income** through **Jan** was \$6,261, net -\$1331 against our required mortgage. The Building Fund Reserve was used to ensure an on-time and correct payment.
- ✦ **Going Forward:** We have strong reserves. That said, last year ended well because we received PPP loan benefits of \$87,600. **We do not qualify for the Round 2 PPP in 2021.** The ECP will be rebuilding in 2021, but it will take the whole year if not longer. **Bottom line, there will likely be a need to support normal operations with \$50-80K from Reserves in 2021, barring additional revenue from other than PPP.** That also assumes the ECP rebuild is mostly successful.
