Going from "You" to "Y'all"

Greetings, sisters and brothers in Christ!

Alright, I'm going to confess something to you. I'm never sure what to do with church mission statements. It's nice to have some lovely words that we can stick under our church name on letters or in the bulletin, but until they become part of who we are, they're just nice words. So, in an effort to dig a little deeper, this is the first of three newsletter articles that focus on our Mission Statement: "We grow in Christ to serve others." And this time I'll be talking about the first part (and word!): "We."

Why start with "we?" Because that word says plenty about the God who brings and binds us together, and invites us to be a loving faith community for the sake of the world.

My first class in seminary was a summer class which taught the ancient form of Greek used in writing the New Testament. Like most good things, it was terrifying, exhausting, and amazing. One of the first lessons I

You are part of a "WE." learned is that the English translations sometimes don't catch all of the second person plurals ("all of you"), which we Texans would probably describe as y'all. For example, look at this: "Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you?" (1 Corinthians 3:16). If I think about this verse focused only on myself, then my response is how I live out this call. But if we consider the plural, it becomes: "Do y'all not know that y'all are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in y'all?" Then the verse becomes about all of us together, and how we live out this incredible blessing

where God has fashioned us into God's temple, and the Spirit dwells in us together. And this happens in Bible verses over and over again:

Now y'all are the body of Christ and individually members of it. (1 Corinthians 12:27)

Y'all are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that y'all may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called y'all out of darkness into his marvelous light. (1 Peter 2:9-10)

This makes a difference in how we think about being Triumphant Lutheran Church. Rather than being just a loose grouping of individuals who happen to wander into the same worship space each week, we instead gather and become God's temple, the body of Christ, God's own people. And we are also called to keep that identity beyond the walls of the church building, and be that royal priesthood and holy nation that proclaims the mighty acts of God. This is God pushing against the idea that each of us is all alone, isolated, and individual, and instead declaring that we are each an essential, important, and beloved part of the Church.

You are part of a "We." May God's blessings be upon all of y'all!

What are you passionate about?

That is a question I periodically ask my grandchildren or other younger relatives. Then somewhere in the conversation, I will also sometimes slip in, "What do you care about? How do you want to make a difference when you are older?" If the answers to the first and second set of questions match up, I then try to draw them out about how they might go about it. Their passion and excitement are really wonderful to see, and by the way, sometimes lead to additional conversations. Sometimes they even say something like, "That's cool, Papa." Well, don't get carried away --- sometimes they don't. But don't sell them short and don't be afraid to go into the deep end of the pool in those discussions. They are often smarter than you think, and just as importantly, they ARE thinking about things, lots of things. Inspiring Stewardship

s we have observed previously, all that we have belongs to God. We are not owners, but managers and stewards. In this capacity, we have a responsibility to manage wisely what God has entrusted to us.

Solomon provided this admonition: "Be sure you know the condition of your flocks, give careful attention to your herds; for riches do not endure forever, and a crown is not secure for all generations" (Proverbs 27:23-24). Today, we might paraphrase his words, "Be diligent to know the state of your finances, and be careful about the status of your possessions. For riches do not endure forever."

Diligence is the key. As stewards and managers, we are not to sit idly by without caring for or knowing about the status of the finances God has permitted us to have. You see, God has invested his wealth not in banks or in some other type of financial institutions, but with people. *Think about it: We are managing God's wealth for him.*

Some people plan their finances based on what might be called the "pot and pan" theory. They are always looking for a "pot" of gold at the end of the rainbow, even as they hope against hope that things will somehow "pan" out. God wants us to be a little more specific than that as we manage our finances. This may mean having a budget. It certainly means having a priority list, planning, and keeping records. *Remember, the money we are handling is God's money.*

There's always a danger, of course, that we might make the care of money and material possessions our greatest focus. There's also a danger that we might seek to increase God's investment to such an extent that the status of our finances becomes an obsession for us.

Remember this: Christians will stand before the Lord Jesus Christ someday to give an account of our lives. Part of that accounting will no doubt include an evaluation of how we have managed God's resources. Part of our accounting will also include an analysis of the money we have invested in God's kingdom by giving to him.

A missionary who was home on furlough was invited to a dinner at a great summer resort where he met many women of prominence and position. After dinner, he went to his room and wrote this letter to his wife: "I had dinner tonight at the grand hotel. The company was wonderful. There were many women present. Some of them were wearing finery and jewels that I'm certain must have cost more than one church, forty cottages for orphans, and twenty libraries." You see, in his great longing for money to provide the gospel for millions on the field, he could not refrain from estimating the value of the silks, satins, and diamonds of the guests at the dinner in terms of his people's needs.

Stop to think about it: If God sends us money to provide the good news of the Gospel to those in need, and we spend it for something else, what must be think of our actions?

As you give your offering to the Lord and Triumphant Lutheran Church, please consider these questions: First, what kind of job are you doing in managing what God has entrusted to you? Second, as you envision standing before Christ someday to give an account, how will your offering today seem then? Will he be pleased with what you have given, especially in light of how much you have kept for yourself? Or will you wish you had given him more?

The Gifts of Discipleship in Avengers: Endgame

As the title suggests, Avengers: Endgame is a movie about endings. Several of these endings involve the deaths of beloved characters, but every hero who falls has sacrificed him- or herself for the sake of others. We know that even the most resilient superhero can't go on forever. So if the good work is going to continue, it must be done by someone else. And that someone else must be trained in the hero's ways.

Discipleship must always be a communal act, taught to us by others and taught to others by us.

We find the same lesson in the gospel story. As we reach the end of each Gospel, we may find ourselves wondering why Jesus ascended to heaven after the resurrection instead of continuing his ministry on earth.

But attentive readers already know the answer: The kingdom of heaven isn't like an empire that expands by conquering followers; like a slowgrowing seed taking root in good soil, the kingdom spreads only when Christians go into all the world and make disciples of all people. The task of doing God's good work never falls on a single person, not even Jesus. It is a communal act, taught to us by others and taught to others by us.

As Avengers: Endgame finishes the story of some heroes and begins the adventures of others, it reminds us believers of our task. The gifts of discipleship aren't ours to hoard, to reduce to weapons in our own personal crusades; rather, they're gifts given to us that we give to others, tools to keep building the kingdom to which we belong.

Call on Your Stephen Ministers

ow often do you sincerely take an interest in others? Last month, we commissioned 7 new Stephen Ministers. They each reflect Philippians 2:3-4 – "Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit, but in humility consider others better than yourselves. Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others." These 7 often take interest in others. They desire to let go of their focus on self to serve others, through Jesus' Spirit living in them. They have reflected on what God has done for them out of love, and responded to His grace and calling in humility. Daily, they seize opportunities to allow the Holy Spirit to guide their steps and share words of hope and joy – which only comes from Jesus.

Life's difficulties, despair, dangers, distresses, and even the results of our own wrongdoings can feel all-consuming. Poor circumstances can slowly drain hearts of joy and peace. In these situations, where do you turn for help? Consider a Stephen Minister, who will come alongside to care, support, and strengthen you to endure in your journey. They will remind you of Hebrews 15:5b ("...because God has said, 'Never will I leave you; never will I

forsake you.' "), in which Christ promises to walk every step of that journey with you.

Each of us has places in our lives where hope has withered. Jesus wants to restore this hope. He sees us compassionately and wants us to hope, trust, and have joy in Him again. Whether in the midst of raising and providing for family, struggling under financial or physical burdens, discouraged by relational tensions or even spiritual challenges, our Lord is not detached or uncaring. He brings help into the situation, often by using others in our lives to comfort, assure, and renew strength. We need to be in relationship and to rely on each other to grow and flourish. Paul wrote in Colossians 3:12 -". . .clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience." As members of God's family, our Stephen Ministers embody these very qualities. Their love for others points others to Christ and brings glory to God. With the promise of complete confidentiality, they will point to the ways Christ reveals His power as He gently mends, redeems, and cures our ailments and struggles in ways we alone could never accomplish.

ow many times have we heard the phrase "a person of faith?" That took on new meaning for me after I read this selection in my daily devotions. I have often struggled with the concepts of faith and love and how they related to each other. I gained a much clearer vision of faith and love after I really thought about this. Faith is very personal. How we believe and what we believe in are decisions we must each make and live out in our daily lives. What does your faith look like for you? Where did you get that vision?

"And now these three remain:
FAITH, HOPE and LOVE.
But the greatest of these is LOVE."

1 Corinthians 13:13, NIV

So faith remains always the actor and love remains the deed.

Since we are the actors through our faith, our deeds become the end expression of love in our lives. I can't speak for anybody else, but sometimes my deeds are more an expression of not loving my neighbor! If I am honest, I can be very selfish with my time and talents. The reading went on to describe our deeds — acts of loving our neighbors — as being like a funnel. We pour in the love and God points the spout of the funnel. We don't always know the recipients of our deeds, but we always know the deliverer of the deed! God uses our deeds for good in his Kingdom.

"Oh, my children! Give praise to God and love also mankind. Neither fasting, nor solitude, nor monastic life shall save you, but good deeds."

— Vladimir Monomachus, Christian ruler of Kiev circa 1125



- Bottom Line: Total Net Income for April was disappointing. Easter is normally a very positive giving and net income month. This year April actually contributed further to minus net income.
- General Offering. Weekly Offering for April was -\$11.1K. Weekly Offering for the year is seriously behind, -\$27K. At this rate our reserves will be seriously tested.
- Building Fund. In comparison April Bldg Fund YTD is only -\$889. Overall, we are 41 months ahead (45 months counting our reserve) on our 20 Yr Mortgage and \$162K interest saved so far toward our Bldg Fund desired 12 Yr Payoff Goal (would save \$266K int). See the larger mortgage chart.
- Going Forward: We encourage all members to adopt an annual plan for growth in giving for both General Operating and Bldg Fund. If you have not adopted a planned way to do this, we suggest as a minimum using the Slow Growth method of increasing annual giving by \$2 per week, or approximately \$100 per year, also remembering that Bldg Fund (our mortgage) is a bit over 10% of our total budget. Let us continue to grow Triumphant's ministry by all of us working together to Grow In Christ to Serve Others.
