

Pastor Aaron's Message

Greetings, people of God!

And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love. — 1 Corinthians 13:13

Years ago, I heard a devotion on describing the work of God in the world, and how we understand that. There were a number of familiar words and phrases: forgiveness of sins, bringing eternal life, restoring creation, etc. But I'll always remember one friend who just said one word: **generosity**. When he was asked to elaborate, he pointed out the many ways God is generous. For example, in the creation story, we get a sense of God's abounding creativity and wonder. When we think about forgiveness, we are reminded of the words of Jesus who frees us from sin and death. When we acknowledge our gifts and skills, we notice the overwhelming blessing of the Holy Spirit. All of it: generosity. God is generous.

This month, we are spending some time focusing on generosity in our worship and our lives. Using the title *Faithful, Hopeful, Loving*, our Stewardship team will guide us toward discovering ways that God has acted in faith, hope, and love, and how we can follow his guidance to share with others.

This is all rooted in 1 Corinthians 13, usually read at weddings, but an important passage for our lives as Christians. In this passage, we hear about a love that isn't focused on wrongdoing, but seeks out the best for others and endures all things. It is a passage ultimately about God's love. How can we live our lives with a love that isn't focused on ourselves, but on how God loves?

Ask yourself these questions: Because God has been so generous to me, how can I share that with others through God's abounding work in the world? How can I be generous with what I have? On November 15, as we consider these questions about living as followers of Jesus, we will fill out commitment cards to plan how we can each live a more generous life in 2021.

I invite you to take time to think about how you can be generous in this upcoming year, remembering God's generosity and incredible giving. Being generous means being part of the amazing and wonderful work that God is doing in the world, and sharing a little more faith, hope, and love.

May our giving God be with you all!

Annual Congregational Meeting

The annual congregational meeting will be held in the Fellowship Hall on Sunday, November 15 at 11:00am, immediately following the 10:00am worship service.

Considerations: In some ways, the meeting will be a bit different and in some ways the meeting will be similar to what we are already doing on Sundays. For instance, due to COVID-19 considerations, we are already holding services both in-person and via Zoom and FM radio. This idea of doing things multiple ways will be continued into the annual meeting. Also, our constitution requires the use of paper ballots in voting for new council members. We must also be able to verify that each person who turns in a paper ballot is actually a voting member.

So, how will we do things?

- Everybody who wants to vote must be present at church so they can be verified in person as voting members. They can be present in the Fellowship Hall (FH), the FH parking lot, or at tables we will set up in the courtyard.
- There will be check-in tables inside the FH to verify who is present. For those who are attending outside, the ushers will verify your presence before the meeting begins and ensure your name is accounted for by our voting member checkers. This applies to both those in the courtyard and those in their vehicles.
- We will also transmit the meeting via Zoom, both for those who are not yet ready to attend larger gatherings and also for those who are physically unable to attend at this time. The briefing slides will appear on Zoom user's computer screens. **However, those participating via Zoom will not be able to vote because our constitution requires us to use paper ballots to elect new Council members.** Nevertheless, we wish all members to be apprised of the meeting events.
- Questions during the meeting: Usually there are few questions, but if either of the outside groups have questions during the meeting, they may give them to an usher who will take them inside. Zoom participants will be given dedicated phone numbers so they may call in questions if desired. If there are more questions than usual, [Robert's Rules of Order](#) will apply, including gaining the chair's permission to speak.
- Finally, in this year of COVID, we ask all to be aware that we will need at least 40 voting members attending the annual meeting in person (10% of voting members) for it to be a legally called meeting. We will move through the meeting as expeditiously as possible. That said, we hope for a large turnout as there are budget matters to understand in this unusual year, and a larger-than-usual turnover of Council members.

Some COVID-19 Legalese

Please be aware of the following binding requirements:

- Any person attending in-person worship must wear a mask and maintain physical distancing. Those who are ill or have tested positive for COVID-19 should refrain from attending in-person worship. Those who are in vulnerable populations may attend, at their own risk. Persons exposed to COVID-19, or who have tested positive for COVID-19, must refrain from attending in-person worship until going through quarantine for at least 14 days and testing negative thereafter before returning to in-person worship.
- Persons who choose to attend in-person worship agree to inform the church promptly if they learn they have been exposed to COVID-19. Notice of COVID-19 exposure should be made by calling the church office at (210) 651-9090, ext. 1, to inform the church of the relevant date or dates of in-person attendance.
- The church will then make the appropriate notifications to others who may have been in attendance on the same date, so they may take appropriate steps to protect their health and safety. The church office will notify public health authorities and will assist them in any efforts to undertake contact tracing.

I have had a few expectations in the past month that really resonate with this quote. Starting with my day of surgery through all the rehab I have done, I was absolutely sure that I would receive the best medical care, from the best staff and care givers, for the best possible outcome. AND — I have not been disappointed thus far. I am walking without pain, and getting set up for outpatient physical therapy, all within the timeline I had in my head. I say prayers of praise every day, many times during the day, and am not shy about thanking God for all the blessings. I guess I was thinking Dr. Peale's idea long before I read the quote!





A Note from the Treasurer

I rarely write articles for *The Trumpet*, but I think it is important to convey what I see behind our financial numbers. As members together of Triumphant Lutheran Church, you might wonder just where we really stand in the shadow of the pandemic and holding worship online for the duration of six months.

This is sort of a good-news/tough-news story. Giving for both the General Operating Fund and the Building Fund remains very generous and very close to the budget approved by the Congregation for 2020. But -- a significant portion of that is due to some very generous one-time gifts toward both funds. That is the good news.

The tough news is that Early Childhood Programs (ECP) that traditionally brought in positive income of between \$7,500 and \$10,000 per month temporarily closed last spring, leaving us short that same amount of money while expenses remained nearly the same. By multiplying that times the six months since Preschool and Mother's Day Out temporarily closed, you can quickly see that TLC income is somewhere between \$52,000 and \$70,000 behind the "old normal." Preliminary indications show us that Preschool attendance is going to be less than half of where we left off at the end of February, and MDO will not resume until January 2021. Rest assured the Council and ECP staff are working hard to rebuild these programs, but it will take time -- possibly most of 2021.

How did we survive that kind of loss? In addition to the generosity of our members, we applied for and received a loan of \$87,000 under the Government Paycheck Protection Program or PPP. That loan was primarily designed to help us keep all of our staff employed, including those in ECP, and also help pay some of our utilities, and that is what we did. We are in the process of getting that loan recategorized as a grant, which should help significantly as we continue to rebuild our ECP at TLC.

Bottom line: We are OK for now, but **not** out of the woods. We continue to depend on your generosity and stewardship of what God has given each of us as we rebuild our ECP programs and attendance. Financially, this likely means we will be using quite a bit of our remaining reserves in 2021, something we will need to rebuild later on, and that will require both continued generosity in giving by our members in addition to hard work by our ECP staff.

Thanks to everyone for all you have done and continue to do for the wonderful body we call TLC.

Having an Attitude of Gratitude

When I was considering what to write for this month's article, the Lord had me notice two things: first, a person wearing a t-shirt which stated "let your gratitude influence your attitude;" and second, the quote "Thou who hast given us so much, mercifully grant us one more thing – a grateful heart" by George Herbert.

When you think of Thanksgiving Day, what comes to mind? Perhaps Macy's parade, turkey and pumpkin pie, football, family and friends around the table, and naps. This seasonal holiday is set aside for more than these — to take inventory of and be thankful for our many blessings. Christians know that God is the true source of ALL our blessings. He loves a grateful heart. 1 Thess 5:18 states that we should give thanks in everything. In reflecting over this past year, how thankful have you been recently? Did you thank God today?

It's truly easy to go an entire day without thinking of God, let alone thanking Him. In America, we have many freedoms such as no one trying to kill or imprison us for our faith; we can openly worship, carry and study a Bible. This comfort can easily lead us to complacency.



Gratitude is easier when things are going our way, but what about when we don't feel like saying thank you due to circumstances in our lives? God not only said to give thanks in everything, but in Ephesians 5:20, He said to give thanks for everything. James 1:2-4 states we consider it great joy when we face hard times because God can use these hard times to strengthen our faith. God uses difficult circumstances to make us more like Jesus. God cares enough about us to grow us in our faith and not leave us as we are.

Giving thanks honors God. Our gratitude will improve our lives. Studies have shown health benefits to having gratitude, for even brief daily periods of time. Such benefits include lowered stress hormones (which enhance the immune system), increased oxygen levels with deeper breathing, and relaxed arteries which increase blood flow to the heart.

Thanksgiving highlights what is important to us. Hopefully, we're motivated to maintain that focus for more than one day – for perhaps a week, month, or even longer. Many start with lists, Facebook posts, or a gratitude journal. These are all good disciplines to change our habits, and therefore, our perspectives and attitudes. It can also be as simple as adding thanks in our prayers, no matter what has happened that day, or sitting quietly with eyes closed concentrating on breathing. Take five breaths, simply saying "thank you Jesus" with each one. Perhaps being able to breathe could be at the top of your gratitude list, for each breath we take is a gift from God. Another option to try is just before falling asleep, reflect on the pleasant and enjoyable things for which you are thankful for that day, both large and small. You may find that you even sleep more soundly.

Choose to be thankful, to pause and praise God for something specific. Notice God daily at work in your life, and try to look past the obvious, bothersome, or scary things to see the reasons to thank Him every day. Granted, some days are more difficult to find things for which to be thankful. On those days, perhaps be grateful for things like having indoor plumbing, a soft warm bed, or even the end of the day. Remember, life is neither all good or all bad. A rose is beautiful and has a sweet fragrance, yet has sharp thorns which can bring pain.

In my experience, gratitude can change me. I continue to press myself to practice an "attitude of gratitude" while still acknowledging the reality of my daily difficulties. I desire to see God's loving fingerprints in all daily aspects of my life. Won't you Join me?



Reverend James Heineke, age 92, passed through death to eternal life. He was born in Hondo, Texas, to Rev. H.A. Heineke and Amelie Weber Heineke. He grew up in New Braunfels, moved to San Antonio, and graduated from Harlandale High School and then Texas Lutheran College in Seguin. He attended Wartburg Theological Seminary in Dubuque, Iowa and was ordained into the ministry of the American Lutheran Church in 1952. That same year, he married Doris Ray McDougall. He served the following congregations: Christ Lutheran Church in Odessa, Texas; Faith Lutheran Church in Weslaco, Texas; Zion Lutheran Church in Castroville, Texas; St. John’s Lutheran Church in Thrall, Texas; Grace Lutheran Church in Sinton, Texas; and St. John’s Lutheran Church in San Antonio, Texas. Many lifelong friendships were made as he faithfully served these congregations. The family is grateful for the strength of those bonds that developed over the decades. He was preceded in death by his loving wife, Doris. James is survived by his sons, Michael Heineke (Connie) and Stephen Heineke (Julie), and by his daughter, Karen Miller (Terry). He is also survived by his beloved grandchildren: David Heineke, Elizabeth Price (Gabriel), and Andrew Cobb (Jill), along with great grandchildren: Lily Price, Violet Price, and Ethan Rocha. These are only facts and figures of his life. To know James, you would experience his gentle spirit, his faith, his passion for music, and his tremendous love for God’s natural beauty. There was always an invitation to accompany him to the San Antonio Symphony, a local theater production, or his church choir performance. Whether he was carrying a canoe paddle to navigate Texas rivers, pruning shears to tend his backyard rose bushes, a walking stick to hike Big Bend, or a pole saw to trim the cypress trees on Turtle Creek, James was always happiest outdoors, especially when he had his favorite helpers, his grandchildren and great grandchildren, by his side. **He taught us to look outside of ourselves and see the world. He reminded us to look to the heavens and see the stars.**


July 6, 1942 —


September 2020 Financials

KEY POINTS:

- ✦ **Bottom Line:** **Net Income** for **Sept** was \$-6K. **Total Net Income YTD** is \$+4K, which includes PPP proceeds of \$87.6K. Just as importantly, we have not had to lay off any employees. See also the Financial Summary bottom of page for more detail.
- ✦ **General Offering:** Weekly Offering through **Sept** was net -\$8K. The ECP's Preschool program has resumed and is now helping, but as mentioned above, PPP proceeds have kept us afloat.
- ✦ **Building Fund:** **Bldg Fund Income** through **Sept** was \$68K, almost even with our mortgage requirement. The Bldg Fund Reserve was used to ensure on-time mortgage payments. We are 46 months ahead on our 20-Yr Mortgage. That's \$162K interest saved to date.
- ✦ **Going Forward:** We are not in trouble financially at the present. We have strong reserves. That said, we have used up our PPP loan benefits, and please note they provided \$87.6K in 2020 Income. That made up for our lost ECP Income. The ECP will be rebuilding in 2021, but it will take the whole year if not longer. **Bottom line, there will likely be a need to support normal operations with \$50-80K from Reserves in 2021.** And so, we will be watching our expenditures very closely while the ECP is rebuilt, starting this month, for as long as it takes.
